
During your stays, you often ask us if there are things to do close to Avignon. Close often means very close.




Visit two "almost" Most Beautiful Villages in France: LES ANGLES

It takes just 5 minutes to get there. Too little known, even by the locals! It's forgotten how famous it was with painters of the 19th and early 20th centuries. And understandably so. What's striking about Les Angles is its "mille-feuille" village feel. The village has many faces.

A village perched in the middle of the garrigue, sun-drenched and swept by the Mistral wind, it hides the beauty of its narrow streets at first glance. It's THE authentic village par excellence. Every photo hits the bull's-eye. But the surprises continue. Descending to the foot of the village, it's an oasis of freshness and majestic hundred-year-old trees, accompanied by a beautiful washhouse. Beautiful homes dot the lower part of the village, and it's easy to imagine Grivolas, Derain or Chabaud being inspired by the place.

3 complementary trails enable you to discover all the treasures of Les Angles: the painters' trail, the heritage trail and the plant trail (allow around 1 hour for each trail). You'll discover a village with a rich heritage: church, wash-house, remains of the fortified castle, Château de Pontmartin (where the painter Montagné lived), tower, etc.






Visit two "almost" Most Beautiful

Villages in France:

BOULBON

A village gem just minutes from L'Atelier. It has it all. At the foot of the famous Montagnette mountain, it's immediately charming with its narrow streets and medieval gates (Porte Loriol), softened by the deliberate presence of vegetation. Boulbon's appeal doesn't stop there:

- The 17th-century Moulin de Bonnet offers a magnificent panoramic view. I highly recommend the 2-hour loop via the Mill and
- The recently restored chât eau (11th century) is now open to the public (guided tour only). A turbulent history...
- Thanks to **its quarries**, the village has become a major venue for the Festival IN de théâtre d'Avignon.
- The **Bottle Procession** on June 1^{er} at 7pm. Everyone brings their best bottle and uncorks it. The priest blesses it. You can guess what happens next...



Tip 2 birds with 1 st one:Try to visit the village on Mondays. There's a market in the alleyways!







St-Roman Abbey

St-Roman Abbey is something of a UFO in the world of religious heritage. It's like no other. You'll find the remains of a **monast ery** carved out of a huge rock (chapel and large cave hall), and you'll be amazed by this open-air troglodytic necropolis.

What's more, it's within easy reach of the hotel. It's the perfect idea when you don't want to go too far, but still want to discover a place that's both magnificent, in the middle of nature, unusual and highly atypical.

A 10-15 minute walk from the parking lot takes you to this hill in the Aiguille massif.

From the summit, the view over the whole region is simply magical (Rhône Valley, Alpilles, etc.). For this reason, we recommend going on a clear day.

Another place that will stay in your memory, and not necessarily highlighted enough in tourist guides.

St-Michel de Frigolet Abbey

Grenoble has its Carthusian monks. Avignon, or rather Tarascon, has its white canons. And yes, when you go to St-Michel de Frigolet Abbey, you're entering a place occupied by monks. That makes all the difference. The place is alive. People come here for retreats. There are services. There are guided tours. There's even a restaurant, the Auberge de la Treille. And above all, there's the famous century-old Frigolet liqueur, which was already mentioned by a certain A. Daudet in his character Père Gaucher.

The place is an invitation to rest and serenity. Situated in the middle of the Montagnette massif, there's nothing but garrigue, pines, thyme and rosemary. Just a few minutes from Avignon, the isolation is total. This is undoubtedly why the locals love to go there at weekends... To say hello to the monks, of course, but also to contemplate the church's murals (magnificent and actually quite rare), drop in at the store or hike the many paths of the Montagnette.

An inspiring place you won't forget!







Castelain chocolate factory

It's been 30 years since Bernard Castelain created this chocolate shop, which has become an Avignon institution. Or should I say Châteauneuf-du-Pape!

It all began on the famous vineyard, when the famous Marc de Châteauneuf-du-Pape was combined with dark chocolate. The result is Palet des Papes ;-)

Today, Castelain chocolates are an essential part of local Avignon gastronomy. But the attraction of this chocolate factory goes far beyond this, offering video projection, a tour of the (very large) boutique, a view of the production workshops through large bay windows and, above all, the choice of one of the many chocolate discovery workshops.

There's something for everyone: a tour of the workshop, making your own chocolates (including workshops for children and families), pairing wine and chocolate (or even truffles), or coffee and chocolate.

And best of all, you can take your own creations home with you!








Is there a grotto in Provence? Yes, and it's in Thouzon, a small village near Avignon.

Of course, the caves of the Ardèche and Gard regions, such as Chauvet, La Salamandre, Les Mademoiselles and Orgnac, have acquired an international reputation. But "little" Thouzon hides its secrets well. It's full of surprises and amazing attractions.

60 million years in 45 minutes: that's the challenge taken up by the cave's guides, who are a big part of the cave's success.

The route takes place in the fossilized bed of an ancient river. The passage is therefore easy and particularly well laid out. New lighting highlights the stars of the cave: the golden-yellow fistulas (ultra-thin stalactites). Some are up to 2m long and only 3mm in diameter. The delicacy of these stalactites is truly impressive. The highlight of the show is the arrival at the basins (see photo). A real treat!

The Hartes Herbes maze

Happiness is often found in simple pleasures. That's the philosophy behind this atypical place, recently created by a farming couple. There are no rollercoasters or thrill rides here, "just" a maze in a cornfield that promises a multi-reconnection with what's essential. There's no need to look at your watch, just take the time to find your way out. Be patient! On average, labyrinth adventurers find their way out in 1h30! And yes, that's longer than a Space Mountain tour... The labyrinth covers an area of 2 hectares.

It's a great idea, especially as each year there's a different route on a different theme (e.g. insects).

Live the experience to the full. Rediscover a kind of France of yesteryear. And rediscover your childhood memories. Watch your children let off steam and have fun in this immense green space.

To complete the experience, bring a picnic and enjoy the pedal gokarts or wooden games on site.







The Capitelles hiking

What is a capitelle? Well, it's a borie. A dry-stone hut, once used by shepherds (flocks of sheep) or farmers (olive harvest). If you're in the Gard, you say capitelle. If you're in the Vaucluse, you say borie. Quite simply.

We often see visitors heading for the village of Les Bories in Gordes (lovely, but not free and very touristy). Well, we propose "our very own village of capitelles" near Aramon. Closer, free of charge, with (almost) no-one around, and fantastic views over the Rhône valley, the Alpilles and the Ventoux, it will take you around 2 hours to cover a perfectly marked 6 km (yellow) trail.

You'll discover the region's historic heritage thanks to excellent information panels. I was impressed by the quality of maintenance and renovation of these stone cabins. A truly magnificent tour!



Tip 2 birds with 1 st one:Why not combine this walk with a visit to St-Roman Abbey.








The Fosses de Fournès Ergil

It's an easy 1h45 walk (almost level loop) on a geological site that's at once unusual, strange, spectacular and very pretty. Between lunar scenery, vineyards and wildlife (lavender, rosemary, kermes oak...), this walk is a kind of UFO in Provence, and is sure to remain in your memories.

The highlight of the show, of course, is the fifty or so clay pitons, ranging from 10 to 30 metres in height, that you'll see on your journey. They are the result of a long process of erosion. The best known is the Mourre de Pitaraçon, a kind of legendary local peak.

The pretty colors of the pitons, ranging from white or yellow to ochre, blend perfectly with the tall grasses of the plateau. For budding geologists, a small protected perennial plant, the Stipa Paviflora, unique in France, has taken root here.

Clay comes in handy in the small village of Fournès, which is still developing a terracotta industry.



Tip 2 birds with 1 stone: We highly recommend combining this walk with a wine tasting at Domaine de la Valériane







We're lucky enough to have a scientific and cultural center dedicated to astronomy and space right next door.

In my opinion, the main attraction of the visit lies in the many "happenings" created by the center: guided tours, planetarium sessions, evening sky observations, telescope workshops and lectures. In short, don't go without calling, and plan your visit to find out about the day's events.

Indeed, the visit takes on a whole new dimension when accompanied by an astronomy instructor. I was deeply impressed by the planetarium session. And I'd like to attend it again as soon as possible, especially as the planetarium (8m diameter dome), now called Claudie Haigneré, was completely renovated in 2022. The experience lasts 1h15 and promises to take you far, far away, to discover lands you'd never imagined. When you leave this session, you'll instantly have taken one hell of a step back from your daily routine. While this may frighten some people, it does me a world of good.







Our TOP 5 restaurants at 15' Max

- o Entre Vigne et Garrigue: Michelin-starred restaurant in neighboring Pujaut. Everything I love about it: traditional Provencal cuisine in a charming, secluded setting (an old farmhouse). Ask to see the restaurant's impressive cellar.
- o La table de Sorgues: Housed in a former manor house, this restaurant has become one of the region's best-known establishments. The Riss couple, originally from Alsace, offer market cuisine. What I like about them is their sincerity. The product comes first, without distorting it with artifice.
- Le Dodo Blanc: As a fan of Creole cuisine, I couldn't help but fall under the spell of this place. Reunionese cuisine, very good quality, and now easily accessible from the hotel. Will you pass the final test of guessing the 7 rhums arrangés?
- La Maison de Celou: Another of the region's best-known restaurants, in Châteauneuf-de-Gadagne. In a restored house, everything is there: quality of cuisine and welcome, and what can we say about its panoramic view of the Ventoux.
- o Le Confidentiel: It may come as a surprise to find it in this selection. Located in a Novotel in the Le Pontet business park, it's not normally the type of address we highlight at L'Atelier. But it fully deserves its place. Firstly, because everyone in Avignon knows it. It's incredibly popular here. And secondly, we must salute the extraordinary work done to create a unique, friendly and festive atmosphere. The food is good, but it's the atmosphere that you come for.
